FROM THE EDITOR

The broad spectrum of subjects relevant to Biblical Studies is well illustrated by the widely differing contributions to this issue, which we trust will provide our readers with informative and stimulating reading.

In an incisive analysis of the forces underlying the present dialogue between Christians and Marxists, Erasmus van Niekerk identifies the issues which are likely to determine the further development of the debate. He also makes clear on what level of sophistication the dialogue is conducted and that much more is expected from the Christian side than merely a naive or ill-informed condemnation of Marxism.

Johan Thom is concerned with a completely different issue. He uses new concepts developed by literary criticism in approaching an old problem, the interpre= tation of parables. By applying Jürgen Link's model of the semantic structure of sym= bols in an analysis of the Prodigal Son, he opens new per= spectives and illustrates the value of these techniques for the interpretation of biblical material.

The article on guidelines for a core syllabus for Biblical Studies at South African Univers= ities, represents an important step towards a more uniform

approach. The question of syllabi was high on the priority list of the S A Society for the Promotion of Biblical Studies at its foundation two years ago. The report published here was compiled by a work committee at the request of the Society. The proposals presented here are based on accepted principles of curriculum development. Although it was developed with specific aims in mind, it is by no means rigid and leaves ample room for improvisation and to accommodate local needs. The implementation of such a core syllabus can only be achieved by consensus and the voluntary co-operation of the institutions themselves, but if accepted as a general guideline, it could solve many problems and improve the position of Biblical Studies in general. We therefore recommend the proposals to our readers for serious consideration. Comments and criticism would be welcomed by the compilers or the executive of the Society.
